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Program Overview

The Social Justice and Activism in France Program is the creation of faculty and administrators at the University of California. It is designed to introduce students to the core principles of social justice and political activism that are at the very heart of French society, as well as past and present social issues facing France and its multicultural population. The program is intended as a rewarding experience abroad for students interested in exploring social issues in context and affords them the opportunity to explore French history, culture, and language by using the city as a classroom.

- Ten-week, team-taught City and Language course provides students with the tools they need to survive in their French language environment and to understand the historical markers in the city that trace the development of social justice and activism in France. Instruction in English and French.
- Ten-week Culture courses in the humanities and social sciences are taught in English.

 <p>CITY AND LANGUAGE COURSE 5.0 UC quarter, 3.3 semester units</p>	<p>Students take one lower-division City and Language course during the ten-week quarter. The Language portion of the course, “Unlocking French,” generally meets one day per week for two-hour class sessions. The City portion of the course, “The City as Public Forum,” generally meets once per week, with occasional lectures and a series of visits.</p>
 <p>CULTURE COURSES 5.0 UC quarter, 3.3 semester units each</p>	<p>Students take two upper-division Culture courses during the ten-week quarter. Culture courses generally meet two days per week for two-hour class sessions.</p>

UCEAP Program Policies and Protocols

Attendance Policy

- Attendance is expected in all course meetings, course-related activities and visits/excursions.
- Plan to arrive on time to all course meetings. You will be marked absent if you are not present at the start of class. You will also be marked absent if you skip out early.
- Absences will adversely affect course participation grades.
You will be required to meet with the Academic Director if it is determined that your lack of participation in a course has a negative impact on the other students in the class (e.g., group presentations). When appropriate, the Academic Director will confer with UCEAP on disciplinary measures to take, including probation and dismissal from the program.

No MAKE-UPS for missed work: if a student is absent on a day when there is some form of assessment (quiz, written or oral exam, test, etc.), there will be no make-up quizzes or exams given.

No LATE ASSIGNMENTS: due to the nature of the program, no late assignments will be accepted and no extensions will be granted.

No GUESTS are allowed to participate in any UCEAP courses or site visits.

Add/Drop Policy

- There is no shopping period. Adding or dropping courses is not an option for any UCEAP Paris Program.

Pass/No Pass Policy

- Students can take one course for P/NP.

Study List Protocol and Transferring Units

- Your study list is the list of courses that will be used to transfer units and grades to your home campus. It is located in your MyEAP space.
- Students are responsible for completing their study lists when prompted by the Study Center.
- All units earned will transfer to UC. Your home campus and major/minor departments will determine how courses fulfill specific requirements. **Students are advised to keep graded work, as it may be requested to accompany a petition for fulfilling a requirement on the home campus.**

Grade Reporting Protocol

Policy on Electronic Devices in the Classroom

- As a courtesy to your instructors and fellow students, you may not use cell phones, laptops, tablets, e-readers, or other electronic devices during class, even to check the time. You will be expected to turn off your cell phone and any other devices during class time. No recording (audio or visual) of class sessions will be permitted.

Policy on Food, Drink and Courtesy in the Classroom

- No food or drinks are allowed in class except for bottled water. Students are expected to behave in a respectful manner when interacting with instructors, administrators, and staff members, as well with their peers in class discussions.
