

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Program Overview

The Global Cities Urban Realities Program is the creation of faculty and administrators at the University of California. It is designed to introduce students to the complex social, political and economic issues brought about by immigration, increasing diversity and urban conflict in Paris and London. The program is intended as a rewarding experience abroad for students interested in exploring the challenges faced by these exciting and dynamic European capitals.

- Eleven-week, team-taught City and Language course provides students with the tools they need to survive in their French language environment and to understand the historical markers in the city that trace the development of French identity. Instruction in English and French.
- Five-week Content courses in the humanities and social sciences are taught in English.
- Eleven-week Workforce course and six-week Internship in English.

The Language portion of the course, "Unlocking French," meets one or two days per week for two-hour class sessions. The City portion of the course, "Pursuing Paris," generally meets twice per week, with one lecture and one visit per week.

Content courses generally meet two days per week for three-hour class sessions.

UCEAP Program Policies and Protocols

Attendance Policy

- Attendance is expected in all course meetings, course-related activities and visits/excursions.
- Plan to arrive on time to all course meetings. You will be marked absent if you are not present at the start of class. You will also be marked absent if you skip out early.
- Absences will adversely affect course participation grades.
 You will be required to meet with the Academic Director if it is determined that your lack of participation in a course has a negative impact on the other students in the class (e.g., group presentations). When appropriate, the Academic Director will confer with UCEAP on disciplinary measures to take, including probation and dismissal from the program.
- Please consult your **IFE Workforce Course syllabus** for grading sanctions on absences and participation for the Workforce Course and Internship.

No MAKE-UPS for missed work: if a student is absent on a day when there is some form of assessment (quiz, written or oral exam, test, etc.), there will be no make-up quizzes or exams given.

No LATE ASSIGNMENTS: due to the intensive nature of the program, no late assignments will be accepted and no extensions will be granted.

No GUESTS are allowed to participate in any UCEAP courses or site visits.

Add/Drop Policy

• Adding or dropping courses is not an option for any UCEAP Paris Program.

Pass/No Pass Policy

- Content and City and Language courses on this program must be taken on a letter-grade grading basis. P/NP grading is not available.
- Internship and Workforce course is graded on a P/NP grading basis. Students whose home campuses require a letter grade for the internship must contact UCEAP to request a grading basis change.

Study List Protocol and Transferring Units

- Your study list is the list of courses that will be used to transfer units and grades to your home campus. It is located in your MyEAP space.
- Students are responsible for completing their study lists when prompted by the Study Center.
- All units earned will transfer to UC. Your home campus and major/minor departments will determine how courses fulfill specific requirements. Students are advised to keep graded work, as it may be requested to accompany a petition for fulfilling a requirement on the home campus.

Grade Reporting Protocol
