Ann Machette - Exhibiting Ourselves: Museums, Display and Identity in London

Dr. Ann Matchette is a cultural historian who works across universities and museums. She has taught at Queen Mary University, the Royal College of Art, and the Victoria & Albert Museum. Her publications explore contemporary notions of material value in early modern Italy. Currently she is focusing more on how value is constructed by museums over time. Her work has been supported by the Leverhulme Trust, the Arts and Humanities Research Council, and the Kress Foundation.



Michael Owens – Policing London: Policy, Law and the Police in the Global City

Michael Owens is a co-founder of London Urban Visits. He formerly led the London Development Agency's development policy and regeneration programs in the Thames Gateway. He has worked on a number of major regeneration projects across London, including Park Royal, and was the chief executive of a regeneration company in the area regenerated for the Olympic Games. Michael is a researcher, writer, and visiting lecturer specialising in London's development, and is currently a Director of Bow Arts Trust in east London.



Dianna Smith – Health, Urbanism and Social Change: London, 1850 to the present day

Dr. Dianna Smith is a lecturer in health services research in the Centre for Primary Care & Public Health, Queen Mary, University of London. Her research interests lie primarily with exploring social and spatial health inequalities, and this is an area in which she is widely published (*Health & Place, International Journal of Epidemiology, Geography Compass*). Dianna is a human geographer by background and made the switch to public health following a Medical Research Council Fellowship from 2009-2012. Her methodological expertise is in small-area modeling of health outcomes, and using Geographic Information Systems to assess differences in health in local populations for local health authorities.
